

Friends and members of Maranatha Baptist Church arrived at the church on October 17th at 6:30 a.m. to begin a historic trip to the state of Kentucky... a 965.7 mile journey that would take the group of 40 to Answers In Genesis’s CREATION MUSEUM and the NOAH’S ARK ENCOUNTER. This was to be a learning, fellowship, and spiritual road trip that would bless each traveler.

Our Big Red Bus, which was our transportation, pulled into the south parking lot. We were introduced to Terry, our professional driver. He would become an integral part of our group’s joy, and his infectious laughter will linger in our memories for a long time.

The excited group would travel to Georgia for their first overnight, and it was obvious on this first leg of the trip that our group would enjoy every mile of the journey. 

Dorothy Burns

It was a cold and snowy February day in Curwensville, PA when Dorothy Mae was born to Mabel and Harry Caldwell. When Harry came home from work he learned it was time to hitch up the sleigh and go through blowing, drifting snow to get the doctor. He and the doctor

arrived back home in time for little Dorothy's arrival. According to her father, the room was so cold that water in a drinking glass froze and had to be broken before her mother could even get a drink.

Dorothy was the third child of ten born to her parents. She remembers a happy family life with lots of music and fun times. Their house was often the neighborhood gathering place. Her six brothers often dared her to do dangerous and crazy feats like jumping off the roof – and more than once! Because the family had no money for extras, she used tar from the road in place of chewing gum! One time, years later, two of Dorothy's offspring, Cherith and Dennis, were visiting at the grandparents'. Remembering their mother's story, they thought they could chew tar too. They broke off a piece of the road and put it in their mouth, stones and all – and promptly spit it out with disgust!

Dorothy's father was the song leader at the local church where the family attended. At the age of seven, Dorothy was saved at evangelistic meetings at their church. The pastor, Harry Rundell, was a good friend of the family. Dorothy often babysat for them and in return Mrs. Rundell gave her piano lessons. Interestingly, years later Mrs. Rundell became Dorothy's stepmother when as a widow she married Dorothy's widowed father.

After high school, Dorothy attended Practical Bible Training School in Binghamton, New York. Her sister, Marian, was also a student there and the sisters often sang together. It was there that she and Ralph Burns met, although they never dated each other. That would come later.

After graduation, Dorothy joined an evangelistic team and sang with the evangelist's daughter, Naomi.

In April 1943, the team went to Sharon, PA to a church pastored by Ralph Burns. It was then that Ralph and Dorothy had their first date - ham sandwiches and milk shakes at Deneens, followed by a ride in the cemetery, where they talked. Evidently Pastor Burns must have been very discreet about his feelings for Dorothy because many people thought he liked Naomi!

The couple maintained a long distance courtship – but not for long. October 14, 1943 Ralph Burns and Dorothy were married by her uncle in her home church in Curwensville. She returned to Sharon, PA, to assume responsibilities as a pastor's wife and did many other things that included a lot of summer camp work in the years ahead.

The Lord blessed Ralph and Dorothy with three children. A daughter, Sharon, was born on Fathers' Day, 1948. Another daughter, Cherith, was added to the family in January of 1953 and then a boy, Dennis, arrived in August 1954. The children all describe their mother in kind and loving terms.

One of their good memories is waking up every Sunday morning to smell Mom browning a roast in the kitchen. They would return after church to a scrumptious smell, and soon enjoy a meal of roast beef, mashed potatoes, and gravy. Dorothy was often entertaining missionaries, pastors, and church members. She was continually cooking and always happy to do the work and to share what they had.

In the winter, Ralph went hunting and usually got a deer. The family ate venison all year long because of that. One gentleman in the church at Butler, IN, was vocal about not liking to eat venison. He and Dorothy had a running debate about it, so one Sunday night after church there was a youth party at the Burns' home. Dorothy made sloppy joes out of venison but didn't tell him. He said they were the best he had ever had! She won!

For forty years Dorothy taught the Primary Sunday School class. (Later she attended many of their weddings.) When the Burns ministered at South Bend, IN, the primary department met in their basement as the parsonage was next door to the church. Daughter Sharon relates that "every week we helped clean up the basement, and we also helped (continued on page 7)

cut out Mom’s flannelgraph figures for the next lesson.” Each Saturday night it was a routine for Mom to wash Dad’s hair in the kitchen sink in preparation for Sunday.

Dorothy was described by the people of the churches as kind, loving, and patient; a godly example. But she was also fun to be around. *A co-worker wrote, “You taught me through your bubbling personality, ready smile and infectious giggle, that laughter – pure JOY – is necessary in Christian ministry.* It carries us through bad times and makes precious memories for the good ones.”

Dorothy and Ralph were devoted to the Lord and served Him together joyfully. They were also devoted to each other. Their children helped in the ministry and likewise with household chores. When they grew up and went away to college, Mom became the dishwasher again and Dad was the faithful dryer. He helped her after every meal; they were a team. After completing the clean-up, they would walk together hand-in-hand around the block.

Ralph pastored churches at Sharon, PA, Wheaton, IL, Worthington, PA, South Bend, IN and Westlake, OH. He served the state councils of the last three state fellowships. He held positions of leadership including treasurer, secretary and chairman. Beginning in 1963, he was associated with *Fellowship of Baptist for Home Missions* and served on the council and executive committee of the mission which was an approved

agency of the General Association of Regular Baptists. Ralph Burns has authored two small books, one regarding his tours of the Holy Land, and the second, *Basic Bible Truths for New Converts*, published by Regular Baptist Press.

Church members spoke of Ralph’s love, friendship, wisdom, and of his being an exceptional shepherd. His social life and friendships were centered in the church through activities like softball leagues, canoe trips, and overnight camping events. He was also a mentor and encourager to young ministers.

In August 1985, Ralph resigned as pastor of Grace Baptist Church in Westlake, Ohio. The Burns then moved to Florida. After serving as interim pastor at Spring Lake Baptist Church for about a year, he became the assistant pastor at Southside Baptist Church of Sebring, FL and served in that capacity about two decades until his death in 2010. Ralph and Dorothy moved into Maranatha Manor in 2009 when Ralph was struggling with cancer. Since her beloved husband’s home going, Dorothy finds comfort and strength in God’s promises. One of her favorites is Isaiah 41:10, “Fear thou not; for I am with thee: be not dismayed; for I am thy God: I will strengthen thee; yea, I will help thee; yea, I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness.”






Life-like and human-like mannequins describe the events of Genesis One throughout the Museum. We met King David, Paul, Peter, Methuselah (over 900 years old) and many others that were very realistic.

The AiG Planetarium found our folks lying on special reclining seats and peering into the Created Universe. After viewing the massive universe all felt we should sing, *“What An Awesome God We Serve!”*.

With some sore feet, we found the “Big Red Bus” and climbed aboard with a fresh understanding of the importance of the book of Genesis, which is indeed the foundation of the entire inspired Word of God.

Our next exploration trip brought us to the largest wood framed structure in the world, Noah’s Ark. Corporate gasps went up from our bus as we came over the hill and saw our first view of this amazing structure, built according to God’s blueprint and constructed over 120 years by Noah and his family. football field and a half long and stands 7 stories high on the Kentucky hillside that encompasses 800 acres.


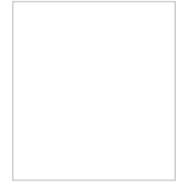

On the day we visited, they announced that in just 3 ½ months they had 400,000 visitors. We all hope to return again, and we all want to encourage our readers to plan a visit if they can.
